Weather/Wind/R ain/poor visibility	All	This section above the weir is grade 1, moving water, and the River Dee is subject to heavy rain and flood conditions, making it unsuitable during floods. Sunburn	Check river Levels before the trip, and if the river is very high or above bank full, the trip will be cancelled.
